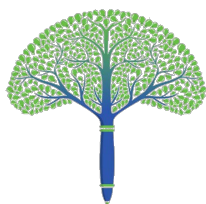

The Storm Lake Heritage Tree Museum, located in Sunset Park, is a unique educational and recreational attraction for residents and visitors alike. A walking path guides visitors through authentic, direct descendants of trees that shaded the lives of famous people, events, and places.

Because the planting of a tree is an investment in the future, this museum offers a unique way to connect both our past and our future.

The museum includes over 40 trees including a Johnny Appleseed Apple Tree, a George Washington Sycamore Tree, General Sherman Maple Tree, and an American Sycamore Moon Tree.

brief history

The museum was founded in 1987 through the efforts of a volunteer group led by former Storm Lake Mayor Wilbur Tucker. All of the trees in the Heritage Tree Museum are seedlings from the original historic tree.

This museum is free and open to the public throughout the year, with the best times to visit during the summer and fall. Each tree has an informational plaque with a brief history of the tree and its lineage.

In 2008, thanks to the efforts of Eagle Scout Darren Johnson, the Storm Lake Heritage Tree Museum received a much needed face lift which reinvented the attraction and utilizes new technology to enhance the visitor's experience. These improvements included expanded histories and an audio tour.
